Parker jailed on \$20,000 bond

Goshen County Attorney Patrick Korell charged the Torrington man Friday who allegedly sent a second threatening e-mail to the wrong address.

Isaac Parker, 27, was charged with allegedly making terroristic threats against Torrington High School and the Torrington Police Department, as

well as blackmail for allegedly threatening to bomb the police station if the authorities did not rescind the charges against him stemming from an e-mail he allegedly sent in August.

Parker was assigned bond of \$20,000 cash only, with the added stipulation he "not live or be present at any location with an active

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computer" he could use. He was still held in the Goshen County Detention Center as of Tuesday evening.

Parker was out on \$7,500 bond stemming from an August 10 incident in which he allegedly sent an e-mail to Torrington High School in Torrington, Conn. threatening to blow up a school. After tracing the e-mail, Torrington, Conn. police found the IP address of the sender to be at Parker's residence in

Wyoming, and concluded he sent the alleged threat to the wrong school and state altogether.

He was initially charged with making terroristic threats and interfering with a police officer after allegedly struggling with two Torrington police officers who were arresting him. Parker pled not guilty and waived an August 23rd preliminary hearing shortly after posting the bond amount.

On September 8, Torrington, Wyo. Police Detective Doug

Weeks received a call from Detective Keith Dablain of the Torrington, Conn, during which Dablain said another threatening e-mail had been sent to the school in Connecticut from the same IP address as before. Weeks said the e-mail threatened to blow up both the school and the police department if charges against Isaac Parker regarding the August 10th incident were not dropped.

After police ascertained Parker was allegedly the only person who could

have sent the mail, he was arrested later that day for allegedly making terroristic threats and blackmail. The two felonies carry a maximum sentence of three years and 10 years in prison, respectively. Parker requested a public defender and is represented by Greg Knudsen.

Because of the alleged threats made by Parker, both Torrington high schools were placed on low-level alert status for the remainder of the day.
